# HART 110 Introduction to Medieval Art & Architecture

Nava Streiter, TTh 9:55am-11:15am

This course takes a broad geographic and chronological scope of "medieval" art and architecture. We focus on the Latin and Byzantine Christian traditions, but also consider works of art and architecture from the Islamic and Jewish spheres.

# **HART 120 History of Chinese Art**

Jie Shi, TTh 9:55am - 11:15am

This course is a survey of the arts of China from Neolithic to the contemporary period, focusing on bronze vessels of the Shang and Zhou dynasties, the Chinese appropriation of Buddhist art, and the evolution of landscape and figure painting traditions.

# HART 215 Topics in South Asian Art - Naturalism and the Supernatural in

South Asian Art Sylvia Houghteling, MWF 11:10am-12:00pm

This course examines the use of naturalistic representations and departures from naturalism in the painting, sculpture, architecture, metalwork and textiles of South Asia.

### **HART 235 Identification in Cinema**

Matt Feliz, MWF 10:10am-11:00am, screenings Su 7:10pm-10:00pm An introduction to the analysis of film and other lensed, time-based media through particular attention to the role of the spectator.

# HART 276 Topics in Museum Studies - African Arts in Diaspora: Ritual, Resistance & Revival Monique Scott, Th 1:10pm-4:00pm

This course explores how "traditional" African art is anything but static, inert and ahistorical. We approach African arts—the sculptures, costumes, masks, textiles and other material cultural that comprise the majority of African art in western museums—as something with lived experiences and living histories.

# HART 310 Topics in Medieval Art - Medieval Manuscripts

Nava Streiter, W 2:10pm-4:00pm

This course explores the contents, materiality, and use of books produced during the long Middle Ages (5th-16thcenturies).

# HART 340 Topics in Material Culture - Textiles of Asia

Sylvia Houghteling, M 2:10pm-4:00pm

This course explores the wide-ranging textile traditions of Asia, spanning from Chinese and Indonesian fabrics to the weavings of Iran and Turkey from 200 BCE to the present day.

# HART 350 Topics in Modern Art - MONUMENTS: Past, Present and Future Lisa Saltzman, W 2:10pm-4:00pm

As Monument Lab continues to work with the Bryn Mawr community to realize a piece of public art that reveals and remembers under-represented aspects of its history, this seminar will immerse students in the political, aesthetic and ethical issues at stake in the creation and reception of monuments, memorials and other sites of collective memory.

### HART 370 History & Theory of Photography

Lisa Saltzman, Th 2:10pm-4:00pm

Photography in the digital age confronts its future under competing signs of ubiquity and obsolescence. To grasp this condition and its consequences, this seminar will look beyond the historical and material boundaries of the medium and open the study of photography to a thoroughly interdisciplinary, multi-media inquiry.

# HART 380 Topics in Film Studies - Contemporary Art & Film in Philadelphia Homay King, Th 12:10pm-3:00pm

This course is open only to History of Art senior majors; permission of the instructors is required for registration. A seminar for the discussion of senior thesis research and such theoretical and historical concerns as may be appropriate. Interim oral reports. Capstone in the major; culminates in the senior thesis.

### HART 420 Praxis Fieldwork Seminar - Museum Studies Fieldwork

In this Praxis course, students will learn to critically evaluate augmented and virtual reality (AR/VR) applications by developing their own AR/VR museum installation.

# **Major Requirements**

The Department of History of Art revised the requirements for the major and minor effective fall 2022. Students who register for the major or minor in fall 2022 or later must follow the requirements as described below. Students who registered for the major or minor in spring 2022 or earlier have the option to follow either the old or the new requirements. Students should contact the current Director of Undergraduate Study with any questions related to the old or new requirements.

The major requires ten units, approved by the Director of Undergraduate Studies. These courses include:

- two 100-level lecture courses homebased in the Department of History of Art.
- one 200-level "critical approaches" seminar (course numbers HART 200-249 ONLY). This course also fulfills the departmental writing intensive requirement.
- two 300-level seminars homebased in the Department of History of Art
- two-course Capstone Sequence (Senior Conference I HART 398 in the fall semester and Senior Conference II HART 399 in the spring semester) through which students produce a thesis of 25-40 pages in length, based on original research.
- •three additional courses taken in any year and conforming to any of the following categories: (a) courses at any level homebased in History of Art (including up to one 400-level Praxis courses); (b) up to two courses at any level in another Bryn Mawr department or program that are "tagged for" History of Art; (c) up to two courses at any level at Haverford, Swarthmore, and University of Pennsylvania in History of Art or related fields (including Studio Art) that have been approved by the Director of Undergraduate Studies to count toward the major; or (d) up to two study abroad courses at any level in History of Art or related fields that have been approved by the Director of Undergraduate Studies to count toward the major.
- •no more than three courses in the History of Art major may count simultaneously toward another major, minor, or concentration.

**Honors:** Seniors whose work is outstanding (with a minimum 3.7 GPA in the major at the beginning of the second semester senior year and excellent performance in seminars homebased in History of Art) may be invited to undertake an honors thesis. Consideration for honors is by invitation only. At the end of the spring semester, if the submitted thesis fulfills expectations for honors, the candidate will be invited to discuss the thesis with faculty members in a one-half-hour oral examination.









# **Minor Requirements**

A minor in History of Art requires six units, approved by the Director of Undergraduate Studies. These courses include:

- one 100-level lecture courses homebased in the Department of History of Art
- one 200-level "critical approaches" seminar (course numbers HART 200-249 ONLY) homebased in the Department of History of Art.
- one 300-level seminar homebased in the Department of History of Art
- three additional courses conforming to any of the following categories: (a) courses at any level homebased in History of Art (including up to one 400-level Praxis courses); (b) up to two courses at any level in another Bryn Mawr department or program that are "tagged for" History of Art; (c) up to two courses at any level at Haverford, Swarthmore, and University of Pennsylvania in History of Art or related fields (including Studio Art) that have been approved by the Director of Undergraduate Studies to count toward the minor; or (d) up to two study abroad courses at any level in History of Art or related fields that have been approved by the Director of Undergraduate Studies to count toward the minor.
- no more than three courses in the History of Art minor may count simultaneously toward another major, minor, or concentration.
