The Psychology department offers the student a major program that allows choices of courses from among a wide variety of fields in psychology: biological, clinical, cognitive, developmental, health, and social. In addition to the considerable breadth offered, the program encourages the student to focus on more specialized areas, through advanced coursework, seminars, labs, and supervised research. Bryn Mawr Psychology majors find that the major program provides a strong foundation for graduate study in all areas of psychology, as well as for graduate work in medicine, social work, law, business, public health, and education. Students majoring in psychology also have the opportunity to pursue an area of further study as a minor in Neuroscience, Health Studies, or Child and Family Studies. A student who wishes to become a Psychology major should choose a faculty member to be their major advisor and fill in a Major Plan with that advisor by the Spring semester of their sophomore year.

A student who wishes to study abroad in their junior year should consult with their major advisor as well as their Dean to select a program appropriate to their academic interests. Students may be able to count (see asterisk below) some psychology courses taken abroad towards their major requirements. Students will need to submit the syllabus for the course to their major advisor, and the advisor, in consultation with the department, will determine whether the course may be used towards the major requirements. Approval is granted on a course by course basis and should be obtained before leaving Bryn Mawr.

Students have numerous opportunities to collaborate with faculty on research projects. Students interested in getting involved in research should approach individual faculty to inquire about research opportunities in the faculty member's lab. Senior thesis work is highly recommended for students who are considering graduate school, particularly psychology Ph.D. programs. Students who plan to conduct senior thesis work should talk with individual faculty members to inquire about thesis opportunities in the faculty member's lab. This meeting should occur by the spring of the student' junior year.

\*With approval, a maximum of two courses (or their equivalent) from Study Abroad OR from another University outside the TRICO (or Penn) OR from AP or IB credit for Intro can count toward major requirements.

<sup>\*\*</sup>Students may elect to place out of BMC's Intro course (with a 5 on the AP or a 6 or 7 on the IB or having taken intro at another College). These students are only required to complete 9 additional full unit courses or their equivalent.
